 - West and east side of Harvey from Ann Arbor Trail to Fleet

Crews are scheduled to continue restoration and brick paving installation throughout the project area.

Keeping Sidewalks Clear

As winter approaches and the snow begins to fall, please remember it is your responsibility to keep all public sidewalks at your home or business clear of snow and ice throughout the coming season.

City of Plymouth Ordinance Section 62-89 requires every property owner and/or occupant to remove or have removed any snow and ice which may have fallen or accumulated within 24 hours of the occurrence. In the case of neglect or refusal, the City may order the removal of same at the expense of the property owner, for not less than \$150.00

"The winter weather doesn't deter walkers in Plymouth and residents and visitors alike often walk to their destination as opposed to drive. Keeping sidewalks clear of snow and ice allow folks to safely move about during the winter months," said Community Development Director John Buzuvis. "We get more complaints about snow and ice that hasn't been removed in a timely manner during the winter months than any other complaint any other time of the year."


Main Street Tree Lighting & Red Kettle Kick Off




Hold your family or business gathering at the Plymouth Cultural Center

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Voucher

Step 1: Starting Monday, Oct. 4, Wayne County residents can obtain one voucher per household by contacting the Environmental Services Division of Wayne County at 734-326-5708 or ESGHelp@waynecounty.com, or your local municipal public works department. **There is a limited supply of vouchers, which will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis.**

Step 2: Starting Monday, Oct. 11, take your County issued voucher, along with acceptable items, to ERG Environmental Services.

- Non-controlled pharmaceutical waste

- Fertilizer, lawn and garden chemicals, pesticides

- · Antifreeze, motor oil, gasoline
- Automotive batteries and dry cell batteries, fluorescent bulbs (all types)
- Fire extinguishers, smoke detectors
